John Traxler, FRSA, MBCS, AFIMA, MIET, is Professor of Digital Learning, UNESCO Chair in Innovative Informal Digital Learning in Disadvantaged and Development Contexts and a Commonwealth of Learning Chair. He was a pioneer of mobile learning in the 2000s with the issues of technology and pedagogy but in the 2010s started working on the impact and consequences on societies, cultures and communities of mobility and connectivity, and the impact on the nature of disadvantage.

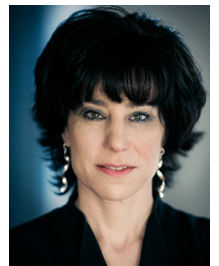


Panelists

She is a lecturer in the Department of Philosophy, National Open University of Nigeria. She is also involved in social advocacy and being a philomath has certifications in Ethics, Humanitarianism, International Politics and Diplomacy, Leadership, Theology and Management.



Maura R. Grossman, J.D., PhD is a Research Professor in the School of Computer Science at the University of Waterloo, an Adjunct Professor at Osgoode Hall Law School of York University, and an affiliate faculty member at the Vector Institute of Artificial Intelligence, all in Ontario, Canada. She is also Principal at Maura Grossman Law, an eDiscovery law and consulting firm in Buffalo, New York. Maura's recent scholarship focuses on responsible Artificial Intelligence (AI) and AI as evidence.



Professor Mausam is the founding head of the Yardi School of Artificial Intelligence, along with being a Professor of Computer Science at IIT Delhi. He is also an affiliate professor at the University of Washington, Seattle. With over 20 years of research experience in artificial intelligence, he has, over time, contributed to many research areas such as large-scale information extraction over the Web, AI approaches for optimizing crowdsourced workflows and probabilistic planning algorithms.



David Mhlanga holds a PhD in Economics, and he is a senior Research Fellow at the University of Johannesburg, South Africa. His research is in Development Economics, Education Economics and Economics of Artificial Intelligence, and participates in Financial Inclusion, Fin-tech, Poverty, the Fourth Industrial Revolution, and the Application of Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning in Education, Business, Finance and Economics. He has published several articles in peer-reviewed academic journals.
